FROM OUR SHARP EYES DEPT. **INGHTSTALKER** LOCAL LITTLE HERO STOPS HIS RAMPAGE

The summer of 1985 was hot and terrifying for Southern California. On August 25, 1985, **Richard Ramirez** pulled his orange Toyota station wagon onto Via Zaragosa in Mission Viejo looking

for someone to kill. At home, in the garage working on his minibike was 13 year old James Romero. James heard footsteps on the side of his house and then saw, through the little screened vent a few inches off the garage floor, a pair of feet walk by.

Petrified, James ran to his dad yelling they had a prowler in the yard. They both went to the front window and saw a

man run across their front yard and get into the orange Toyota. James and his dad went outside, and as the Toyota drove slowly by, James wrote down the license plate number and called police.

An hour later, Richard Ramirez drove down Chrisanta Drive in Mission Viejo and saw a house with the garage door slightly open. He crawled inside the house, found and shot Bill Carns in the head and raped his girlfriend.

It would be the last attack from the Night Stalker. Orange County Sheriff Deputies used the license plate number provided from James and his dad and had the name and fingerprint of Richard Ramirez. He was arrested not long after that terrible night when he made the decision to come to Mission Viejo.

Thirteen year old Mission Viejo resident James Romero was a hero. He received reward money, Rams tickets, an ATV from Mission Yamaha, and he testified in an LA courtroom for two days. Today, James is 45 years old, married and with 4 kids.

The Mission Viejo Reporter asked James what the strangest

moment during that whole experience was .James said that during his time on the witness stand, Richard Ramirez would stare at him, and one time, Ramirez locked eyes with him and winked.

Beginning October 1 and finishing on Thanksgiving, the City installs all of its beautiful holiday lights.

Here are some fun facts:

- 10,000 strands of lights
- 70 lights per strand = 700,000 LED lights
- Begin installing lights October 1 of each year; and finish by Thanksgiving. All are taken down and stored by the end of January.
- It takes 3 different contracting firms along with City staff to coordinate and install a



coordinate and install all of the decorations.

- The star on the Community Tree at La Paz and Chrisanta is 4 feet across.
- It takes 2 large shipping containers to store all of the lights.
- Over 700 extension cords are needed.
- Over 23,750 feet of electrical tape are used. That's 4.5 miles of tape.


Since my Mission Viejo neighborhood does not have a homeowners association, if I wanted to, could I paint my house hot pink?

- Steaming in Mission Viejo


Dear Steaming in Mission Viejo,


Lake Mission Viejo, 1975





THE Origin of the Mission Viejo Streetlight



Streetlights are typically not the most interesting subjects to discuss. The iconic ones here in Mission Viejo actually are. Their official name is the 'Mission Bell Luminaire', and they were **commissioned** to be made by the **General Electric Company** for the **Mission Viejo Company's** exclusive use.

They are based on the famous 'El Camino Real Bell' from the San Juan Capistrano Mission and took two years to design by employees of General Electric, with some help from employees of the Edison Company. Photos



were taken of the original bell, and then two engineers **scaled** it down to streetlight size in exact proportion. They even duplicated the bell's color. Each streetlight is made of cast aluminum and has 250 watts of power.

The scroll is modeled after a Tuscan Mediterranean Flourish from the Renaissance Period which spread throughout Europe.



Meanwhile in San Juan Capistrano: They use the bell shape of the Mission Viejo streetlight, but without our trademark scroll it looks a little anemic. FROM OUR BUILDING A CITY DEPT.



CHANGING FROM ONE TYPE OF RESIDENTS TO ANOTHER



There are numerous accounts of what had to happen in order for the Rancho Mission Viejo company to turn this desolate haven for coyotes and snakes called Rancho Mission Viejo, (essentially a cow pasture) into what is now considered one of the safest and most livable cities in America. **Gaspar de Portola** marched right through Mission Viejo in 1740, and according to one rumor, saw a snake and declared this valley unfit for humans.

In the 1960's, there was much doubt as to whether

people would drive this far down in the OC to live. The coyotes and snakes were of no help whatsoever. After spending (with help from Edison) most of their money in developing infrastructure, the Rancho Mission Viejo Company, in case it didn't work out, shrewdly engaged the Dean Brothers to build the first group of homes on the La Paz hill. Much drama, much anxiety.

It ended with a lottery and was a huge success. People liked the country feeling and the concept of a planned community. Huge sigh of relief, as word spread, and Mission Viejo was on the map! Coyotes and snakes were given orders to move on!

Gaspar would be shocked -- Mission Viejo now has over 100,000 humans and is a model of community development. It is recognized internationally for the famous Natadores diving team. It boasts a lake with real fish, the 1984 Olympics bicycle race monument, a

prehistoric **whale** fossil, paved roads, a giant YMCA complex, award winning schools, a library with a world class 'STORY ROOM', etc., etc. Who wouldn't want to live here? Almost everyone now it seems, except for coyotes and snakes. - **C.J. VerBurg**





FROM OUR BEAUTIFUL WATER DEPT.

Mission Viejo's Water Source is Safe

Camouflaged in the hills throughout Mission Viejo are several water tanks. Santa Margarita Water District has three of them and all are on constant security surveillance watch -Alicia (located on Alicia Pkwy between Santa Margarita Parkway & Olympiad), Casta del Sol (located in the CDS development), and O'Neill (located on Felipe just south of La Paz.)



The tanks are located on select hills due to the need for efficiency and the cost of moving water both into and out of the reservoirs. Part of the beauty of Mission Viejo is the topography, but it takes a lot

of energy to move the water around and up and down those grades.

The system is designed to pump water into the reservoir at night when energy is cheaper, and then gravity takes care of moving water during the day.


coaches at this year's Opening Ceremonies. Most of the team members were able to attend. Many brought memorabilia and souvenirs from their championship journey.


