FUNGUS AMUNGUS!

TINY PEST CAUSES A HUGE AMOUNT OF DAMAGE



ave you ever seen a stately, majestic Sycamore in one of our Mission Viejo parks? Its branches are held high, shading thousands of folks relaxing and playing near it each year. Sadly, there are unwanted invaders from the other side of the Pacific that prefer to make their home in our superb Sycamores, Sweetgums, Palo Verde, Coral Trees and Jacaranda's.

The Polyphagous Shot Hole is a tiny exotic pest that is believed to come over from southeast Asia in the packing material of shipping containers and now runs rampant in Mission Viejo. In their mouth parts they carry and vector a disease to trees called Fusarium, which is detrimental to over 137 susceptible trees, to

the point of decline or death. Contact your local ISA Certified Arborist to inspect your trees regularly and insist that your **elected officials** become informed and have a plan to address this growing pest menace that threatens our trees and our safety.
