E BEARS ARE WATCH so Parkway - Ticket Cen

Did you know the word bear translates to Oso in Spanish? On Mission Viejo's main drag of Oso Parkway between Felipe Road and the I-5 Freeway is where many of our motor officers keep a watchful eye on our speed.

In other words, the bears are watching along Oso Parkway like no other roadway in our city. The speed limit in that section of road is 45 mph. Most citations given out in Mission Viejo are along this stretch of roadway.

FROM OUR BACK IN THE DAY DEPT.

El Camino Real's Early History

The "ROYAL ROAD" as the Spanish called it, moved through Mission Viejo along its present western city limits. Stage coachs appeared on El Camino Real in the 1850's, further linking San Diego and Los Angeles, with stops in San Juan Capistrano and a whistle stop in Mission Viejo area at Galivan. By 1866 passenger service was refined from a two-day trip in each direction – including a necessary overnight stay in San Juan Capistrano, the half-way point for passengers.

One of the horse-changing stations of the stage line was located within today's Mission Viejo at Aguaje del Cuate (Twin Springs). This fresh water source was near the SMWD water treatment facility at the end of Camino Capistrano (near Oso Parkway and Cabot Road).



During the time of the Spainards controlling Mexico, these fresh water springs were one of the best known landmarks between San Diego and Los Angeles. Here on the Camino Real, water was always available.





"NEXT STOP MISSION VIEJO"

GALIVAN WHISTLE STOP AT OSO PARKWAY



The **Galivan Whistle Stop** at Oso after its removal. On the left is the Santa Fe train tracks, to the right is Camino Capistrano (US101). Far right, is the newly built I-5 (photo from 1959).

Santa Fe Railroad Galivan Whistle Stop - 1880

When railroad tracks were laid over El Camino Real in the 1880's, a whistlestop railroad siding between Avery & Oso Parkway called **Galivan** became a daily Santa Fe stop.

The old Galivan Overhead Whistle Stop served traffic on US 101 for 32 years between 1927 and 1959. It was removed in 1959, due to the San Diego Freeway (I-5) construction. It was located just south of Oso Parkway, and has now been covered by Cabot Road. The highest point of elevation on the entire Los Angeles to San Diego line is in Mission Viejo at milepost 189 near Alicia Parkway.

THE OLD FOR THE OL



Old US 101 is perhaps the most historic highway in California. It follows the route that Spanish explorer Juan Gaspar de Portola followed in 1769, and later became El Camino Real, (also known as the King's Highway). The old trail linked the 21 Spanish missions. This historic road served as the main north/south road in California until 1959 when the Interstate 5 was completed.

Here locally, US Highway 101 was built north of San Juan Capistrano, near Mission Viejo, as a narrow "single slab" concrete road. In the 1930's, it was widened to a "twin slab" concrete road. Portions of this road with the visible overlay can still be seen on Camino Capistrano just past In-N-Out Burger.

MISSION VIEJO St. Patrick's Day Parade

It began in 1969, when two friends met at the Mission Viejo Country Club bar and bet they could get at least 100 people to show up for a parade. Twenty-five years later, their wager had grown into a large-scale community event that drew 111 parade entries, featuring floats, marching bands and strolling clowns.

1994 marked the end of the road for the only St. Patrick's Day Parade in Orange County. It grew too large and costly for the small Mission Viejo Activities Committee volunteer group to stage. Many businesses participated like **Bare-Le There Gymnastics**. As you can see from the pictures, horses, bands and even **Mickey Mouse** showed up!

The parade route was along Marguerite Pkwy from what is now Olympiad to a left turn on Alicia and around the lake loop.


1. School Resource Officers

- Mission Viejo has School Resource Officers that visit our schools. Their having a visible presence at school, deters students from negative behavior. It also encourages students to talk with the officers if they have a concern.
- **2. Motor Officers** Mission Viejo actively promotes safety on our roadways. The high visibility of motor officers slows down motorists.
- **3. Neighborhood Watch Program** Mission Viejo encourages its residents to form Neighborhood Watch groups. By working together with law enforcement, residents become involved with the safety of their city.
- **4. Parks & Recreation** Mission Viejo has 53 parks and trails, as well as 8 recreation and community center facilities. There is a multitude of outdoor activities for kids that promotes positive recreation and deters negative recreation.
- **5. Graffiti Removal -** Mission Viejo's Graffiti Hotline number is (949) 460-2924. Within 24 hours of a tip, the city removes graffiti. By removing graffiti as quickly as possible, the city demonstrates graffiti vandalism will not be tolerated.

CULTURES TELET FIRST BAPTISM IN CALIFORNIA



As the Portola expedition traveled north from San Diego, and before crossing the land that would be Mission Viejo, the men of the expedition stumbled upon the Native American Acjachemen tribe, near Cristianitos Canyon, during their search for a place to rest over night. The Acjachemen people told the priests there were two young girls who were very ill.

In an effort to help these young girls enter heaven, Father Francisco Gomez performed a Christian baptism July 22, 1769, becoming the first known baptism in Alta California. To celebrate this sacrament, the missionaries named the area "Los Cristianitos," meaning "little Christians."

The site was officially named a historical landmark in 1957.

A marker and a cross have been erected at the site to identify the area off Cristianitos Road, near the base's Cristianitos

gate. Near the cross, a small trail leads to the spring where Gomez performed the historical celebration. The spring has been made into a well, and a plaque describing its significance sits near the location.

For over thirty years, a play and a pageant commemorating the historical event were performed by a San Clemente community theater group. The last performance was in 1988.





JUMPAROUND:



Mission Viejo's Own Astronaut

Q&A

Michael López-Alegría (born May 30, 1958) is a veteran American astronaut; he has completed three Space Shuttle missions and one International Space Station mission. He is the All-Time Most Experienced American Spacewalker having spent a total of 67 hours and 40 minutes being outside outside a spacecraft beyond the Earth's atmosphere. He is also from Mission Viejo.

Why did you want to become an astronaut

I wasn't smart enough to invent a cure for cancer, I couldn't play the piano like a concert pianist, I couldn't do a lot of things, or anything really, really well, but I could do sort of a handful of things reasonably well. When I looked at what

the astronaut profile was—at that time they'd just started hiring shuttle astronauts—and so it seemed like they were looking for people with a broad skill base and I kind of thought that I might be able to fit into that.

I moved to Mission Viejo in early 1967. There were just over 400 people there. I won't say how much my parents paid for their house, but it wasn't very much. And, when I left to go to the Naval Academy in 1976, there were over

100,000 people there. I thought it was a really nice place to grow up. It was quiet, safe. Southern California is a beautiful place. I mean, what's not to like? I have nothing but good memories.

Well, like everybody, we're all influenced by where we grow up more than anything. I certainly remember getting some guidance in high school from my guidance counselor, from my teachers, encouraging me to do the math and science thing, fitting well with what I liked anyway. Going to the Naval Academy was obviously a big step, because that sort of led to being a pilot which led to being a test pilot, etc., etc. I sort of got that idea from the people in my high school. I remember those days, pretty fondly.

After Mission Viejo High School; I went to the Naval Academy and graduated in 1980; I studied systems engineering. I then went to flight school, became a Navy pilot, and then I was selected to be an astronaut in 1992.w

What was your primary job on the International Space Station?

To continue the assembly of the space station, which has sort of been on hold for a while since the Columbia accident, so in general our mission is going to be to receive a couple of shuttle flights, do some construction while they're there. After they've gone, we're going to be receiving three Progress vehicles, which means a lot of cargo, loading, unloading. And, in general, the focus is going to be construction and assembly. Every time something comes, you've got to unpack it, and that takes time. And time is [always] going to be a significant challenge for us. The second thing is, when we unpack that stuff there's got to be some place to put it, and the station is already pretty full of stowage. The challenge is to find where to stow the stuff that's brought up.
