

This should be on everybody's To-Do list. In fact, it's most enjoyable when you walk fairly fast. Basically it is a social walk.


Starting at the parking lot of Vista Del Lago, proceed in a clockwise direction around the lake, heading North on Marguerite,







QUESTION FOR THE CHIEF: Recently I've had my driver's license taken away (for reasons I'd rather not disclose) and was wondering if I could drive a golf cart in the bike lane on Mission Viejo streets to go, to and from work. - Tony B

A: ANSWER:

Hello Tony,

As defined in our California Vehicle code, a golf cart is a motor vehicle designed to carry no more than two persons, including the driver and golf equipment, weigh no more than 1300 lbs when empty and operate at a maximum speed of 15 mph. The California Vehicle Code that governs golf carts travelling on city streets in our state is VC 21716. It states that golf cart use is limited to speed zones of 25 mph or less. However, if you operate a golf cart on a road it must be equipped with the following:

A) At least one headlamp, tail lamp and stop lamp. B) A rear reflector. C) Front/rear turn signals. D) Front/side reflectors. E) Mirror. F) Horn. G) Fenders. H) Safety-glazed windshield. I) Windshield wipers.

You must also register your golf cart with the DMV (This requires a Vehicle Identification Number). You must also wear a seat belt. Lastly, if the road that the golf cart is being driven on (with a speed limit of 25 mph or less) has a bicycle lane, a golf cart may not be driven in the bicycle lane with the exception of making a right turn.

Furthermore, it must have a license plate and insurance also. It may not cross any road that is posted higher than 25 MPH. They can also be driven anywhere on private property unless prohibited by the HOA. However, they may not drive on any trail, running path, etc.. Although legal, the safety features on a golf cart is not designed to provide adequate protection from a collision with a car.

So it can be done and is permissible, but with the above restrictions and efforts required to register a golf cart for travel on city streets, I have never seen it done. For Questions for the Chief, e-mail questions to:


However, the Mission Viejo Reporter asks the question: "What exactly is it made of?" We asked around and didn't get a solid answer. What we did get were some interesting theories.







The late **Jim Rohn**, a former Mission Viejo resident is the man many considered to be America's foremost business philosopher. Jim Rohn spent a career helping and encouraging others - we share with you here his classic "Ant Philosophy".



I think everybody should study ants. They have an amazing four-part philosophy. Here is the first part: **Ants never quit.** That's a good philosophy. If they're headed somewhere, and you try to stop them, they'll look for another way. They'll climb over; they'll climb under; they'll climb around. They keep looking for another way. KEEPING EYES ON THE ROAD

A stretch of freeway in Irvine near Culver Drive is named after Mission Viejo resident **Mitch Waller**.

In 2013, Mitch Waller, who served as Westminister Police Chief and as Westminister City Manager, was riding in the bike lane when struck and killed by a 25 year old distracted driver.

Mission Viejo neighbors remember Mitch as the man who knew how to fix anything and would volunteer to share his handyman expertise with those on his street. An avid cyclist, Waller was traveling along one of his favorite routes — the 133 freeway — with friend and Westminster employee Kevin Beach when his life ended.

Sally Waller committed to a personal mission: spread the word about the dangers of distracted driving. "That's where my heart and desire is now," she said. "If I can save just one life, or keep someone from going through what we went through, it is worth it."

Sally Waller said she believes her husband's memorial sign is a great way to remind the thousands of motorists who will pass it every day to put down their phones and concentrate on the road. Family and friends want the sign to be a reminder of the dangers of distracted driving.

The woman who hit Waller was sentenced to a one-year license suspension and 500 hours of community service. Due to this light sentencing, Sally is working with legislative representatives to make penalties much stronger.

HOW TO TURN OFF YOUR ELECTRICITY, GAS, AND WATER

Part of emergency preparedness is simply learning what to do in case of an emergency.

Suppose your home was flooding . . . would you know how to turn off the water? What about the gas? The electricity?

1 Emergency Water Shut Off Instructions



If it's an isolated problem, turn off the valve closest to the problem. Look for a stop value—connected to the water supply pipes, usually chrome-plated or plastic—which should be directly underneath the toilet, faucet, or fixture. Under a sink, you will have one for hot water and one for cold.

If this does not solve the problem, turn off the water to your home. The shut off valve is usually located at the entrance of the cold water pipe to

your home. It's usually located outside near the street. You may spot a red handle on the valve. Turn it clockwise to shut off the water supply in an emergency.





2 Emergency Electricity Shut Off Instructions

Find the circuit breaker box. You might need to open a metal door to see inside the breaker box. You will see a circuit breaker marked "MAIN" with on and off positions marked. Move to the 'off' position



3 Emergency Gas Shut Off Instructions

In the event that you smell gas, turn off the gas meter. Usually it is at the front or side of your home. Remember that once it is shut off, you need to call the Gas Company to come and turn it back on. Give the valve a turn one quarter of

the way in either direction using a long-handled wrench. The lever should now be sitting crosswise to the pipe.

To ensure emergency preparedness, teach every member of your family how to shut off the electricity, gas, and water. Learn the location of your electric, gas, and water sources and include this information in your Family Communication Plan.

The OCSD Crime Prevention Unit recommends:


- Lock your vehicles and never leave anything valuable inside the vehicle.





Back in 1980, the Mission Viejo High School Boys Water Polo team won the CIF Championships. Sophomore Kadin Kendall's father, Kevin, was on the team then, and now his son helped the team win again. The team drove all over Southern California to end up competing against their hometown rivals, Trabuco Hills High School. The first two rounds were local, but moving onto quarter-finals, the team went to Camarillo. The win there sent them to Indio for the semi-finals, which sent up the Championship match agains Trabuco. On Saturday, Nov. 16, 2019 MVHS battled THHS for the CIF Championship title and won!

Because of that win, the team moved onto CIF SoCal Regional State Championships. The boys were determined to take it all the way by this point, and so they won three more games over Nov. 23th & 24th to take

the title of CIF SoCal State Champions. SoCal & NoCal do not compete against each other, so that was the end of their Championship Season.
