Regardless of who is to blame for the incorrect registrations, I strongly encourage all voters to verify their existing voter registration status at the California Secretary of State's website by visiting https://voterstatus.sos.ca.gov. Mission Viejo's voters should also visit the Orange County Registrar of Voters' website at www.ocvote.com to verify that their information is correct.

If you see anything that needs to be changed, please contact the Registrar of Voters at 714.567.7600. If you have not yet registered to vote, you can register at the Secretary of State's website by visiting https://registertovote.ca.gov. The last day to register to vote for the March 3rd election is February 15th.

race at the 1988 Seoul Olympics. Especially pleasant are the Olympic Gardens – a place to relax, unwind, and walk among the gardens that have been designed with an international flair.

The first garden has a large wood shelter and a playful tulip fence incorporating the Olympic Rings. After crossing over a wooden bridge, a side path leads to a second garden with a brass and bronze sundial. The third area is a community rose garden complete with the perfect "Olympiad" red rose. The fourth setting is the aromatic herb garden with a Moorish stone urn, accompanied by traditional lemon and orange citrus trees. The final area is a walled, outdoor garden room which includes a stone water wall. 

he Mission Viejo Reporter sat down with Mission Viejo Councilman Greg Raths and discussed his extortionary life. Raised in Arizona, graduated from Arizona State University, went onto flight school and graduated at the top of his class (Only the top new aviators went onto fly jets; the restflewhelicopters). In 1996, Greg took on a prestigious assignment at the White House (His office was just doors away from the Oval). After Greg retired, he was a pilot for Jet Blue. Now, he looks after the City of Mission Viejo and it's residents as a proud city councilmember.

What's been a big hurdle for you toovercome? Successfully completing military jetflight training was mybiggest hurdle in life. I endured 15 months of training where I was evaluated and challenged academically, physically, and aeronautically. June 24, 1977, the daywhen myfather pinned on my Navy Gold Wings, was a very proud moment for me.

Who were your biggest influences growing up? My mother was my biggest influence on me growing up. Shekeptmedisciplined and focused on what was important in life. She believed in education, service, and orderliness, and passed it on to me and my siblings.

What was your first car? I purchased my first car at age 21 when I was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marine Corps. I bought a 1974 Chevrolet Malibu, white with a maroon top. With a steady paycheck now coming in, many of us newLieutenantswerebuying cars, thus thename 2nd Lieutenant mobiles came into our vocabulary.

Have you ever landed on an aircraft carrier? I have over 500 carrier landings on various Navy aircraft carriers. My first landing was in 1976 on the USS Lexington flying the jet trainer T-2 Buckeye. I later flew the RF-4B Phantom II off the USS Midway. I concluded my carrier flying as the

Commanding Officer of a Marine Corps Fighter/Attack Squadron flying the F/A-18 Hornet off the USS Abraham Lincoln.

Do you remember where you dropped your first bomb? I flew in three combat operations, the most notable Operation Desert Storm in 1991. My first taste of combat was in February 1991, flying the F/A-18D Hornet. It was during Desert Storm that I first released live ordnance on enemy positions.

What is your fondest memory of working in the White House? I had the honor to be assigned to the White House from 1996-1999, as Assistant ChiefofStaffoftheWhiteHouseMilitary Office. I was a Colonel during this tour ofduty. Myfondest memory was sitting in the Oval Office with the President, Vice President, Secretaries of Defense and State and the Chairman of the Joint

Chiefs of Staff. I thought, "How did this kid from Arizona end up in the most powerful room in the world with the most powerful men and woman in the world?"

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

Painting by Mission Viejo Artist Leads to Design of County Medal

A painting by Mission Viejo artist Lloyd Harting inspired the design of the Orange County bicentennial medal, struck in honor of the 200th year since the first Spanish settle-ment was established in this area.

Harting's watercolor of the Portola party as it crossed southern California in 1769, is also on the cover of the written account of that first Spanish land party—The Call to California. The Portola expedition crossed the Clemente graphics designer. county two centuries ago and established what came to be El Camino Real, the route linking the 21 California Mis-

The obverse of the medal was designed through the combined efforts of W. Harold Lang of Fullerton, the bicentennial committee's ad-ministrative director; Doris

Clemente, graphics designer.

Saddleback Setting

Harting's painting was lo-calized with county scenery— Saddleback Mountain in dominance as it appears from both the Capistrano and Santa Ana Valleys, (two sites selected for Missions). Capistrano's was es-tablished in 1776 — coincident with the birth of the United

Artist Harting, of 24496 Chamalea Drive, Mission Vie-jo, is a nationally recognized "Western" painter. His work has appeared extensively in calendar and Christmas card art for over four decades. He first placed paintings on public display only three years

ago.

Semi - retiring from Hollywood to Mission Viejo, he
has since had hangings in
such galleries across the country as the Grand Central in
New York. Eight of his commissioned paintings of the Far
East are also in the permanent
U.S. Air Force collection.

Disney Art Direction

Versatile, too, in various phases of commercial art, he also handled art direction for the Disney movie "Bambi" and was instrumental in crea-tion of "Fantasia" and "Pinoc-

This pictorial historian's wa-tercolors for "The Call to Cali-fornia" were researched to capture details of the orig-inal scenes as the first Span-iards crossed California and

NEW LA PAZ MODELS SHOW INNOVATIONS

The completion of two new model homes, located on Floresta Lane off La Paz Road, introduces two new plans in the La Paz series now being constructed in Units 17 and 18.

Since the April 1966, open-ing of La Paz homes, when 92 homes were sold from five models in 140 minutes, these homes have continued to set sales records for the industry.

With over 1,100 now hav-ing been sold, the Market Research department has obtained sufficient data to suggest possible improvements these already - successful de-

Ideas Weighed

A number of recommenda-tions were considered and these news plans reflect the best of these suggestions.

One of the two models is the San Carlos, (Plan 35), a four-bedroom home with family and dining rooms. The San Felipe (Plan 21), is one of four available in this series. A three or four-bedroom home with family room, and a three or four-bedroom design with dining room are other variations in the series.

Hillside Locale

Other alterations in basic plans were made to allow proper utilization of home placement on the hillside view

Enlarging the kitchen area into an extended U-shape design was one of the most frequent requests of homeown-ers so that space for informal dining in a corner "nook" was

Another feature is the stepdown living room with fire-place in the San Felipe. The San Pablo offers a fireplace in its family room.

Practical Touches

Cabinet and closet place-ment has also been modified in the recent models with increase in storage area provid-

In the four-bedroom, twobath San Carlos home, which replaces the San Angelo design, the exterior concept has been revised. Covered entryways with wrap-around gar-den walkways are a feature of the new models.

Interior changes in the present design make the formal dining room an extension of the living room. The kitchen is now separated from the dining room by an interior wall.

The master bedroom accents privacy with an option that offers a divided bedroom suite with retreat. Greater closet space and an extension of glass sliding doors for ac-cessibility to the outdoors are additional features.

Other practical features in-clude the utility area which has been separated and elong-ated to allow for indoor utility wash area.

The living area features the sunken floor level concept, and kitchen area offers a passthrough counter for patio en-tertaining.

Both models will give pros-ective buyers a "preview" of pective buyers a preview of the 97 homes now under con-struction in these two units. Completion for Units 17 and 18 is scheduled for late Spring.

A Life Spent Volunteering

The City of Mission Viejo lost a dear friend and a "Hometown Hero" with the passing of Mark "Ziggy" Wilczynski in 2017 at the age of 95.

After fighting for freedom in the Polish Underground Army during World War II, Ziggy and his wife, Nina, came to America-a land that he deeply loved. Through his work with the Mission Viejo Company, Ziggy helped to physically build Mission Viejo, and with his years of volunteer service also contributed to creating many of our unique and special programs.

He helped with the Olympic Bicycle Race in 1984, and later was instrumental in the creation of a Finish Line to commemorate the site on Olympiad Road. Ziggy was the City's unofficial "historian" for years

through his informative displays in the Library and the treasures and memorabilia he collected. Ziggy loved children and brought joy and wonder by serving as Joseph for 20 years in the Live Nativity performance on the Four-Corners. He received numerous recognitions over the years, including receiving honors from his home country of

Poland, President George H. Bush, the State of California, the County of Orange, and our City of Mission Viejo.

Next to the Lake Mission Viejo entrance and the finish line for the 1984 cycling portion of the Olympic games you will find a memorial dedicated to him. In 2011, the Mission Viejo Rotary Club supported the funding for a statue of a bear, affectionately named "Ziggy" to be placed

there and benches to sit down and enjoy the sights along the Lake path. The bronze plaque there says, "All my days start with volunteering somewhere. I've built my life around doing things for others -Ziggy Wilczynski" A fitting tribute for the man known as 'Mr. Mission Viejo'.

thought he'd stop by the pool supply store and have his pool's water tested.

As Ron Eroh entered Leslie's Pool Supply Store on Marguerite Parkway, he noticed several people, standing behind the water testing station. They all were looking down at the floor. No one was talking. He heard the store manager say, "Stand back. Give him room." Ron's eyes searched in the direction of his voice and found his target. The manager was kneeling on the floor, cradling a man's head in his lap. Then, the store manager said, "He's not breathing."

Ron yelled as loud as he could, "Get out of my way." People scattered in all directions, except for the manager. He immediately dropped to his knees and started chest compressions... CPR. Pump. Pump. Pump. Ron performed CPR while singing to himself the tune and lyrics from "Staying Alive" by the Bee Gees. He had seen it on TV.

Pump. Pump. Pump. Ron kept up the cadence while singing the song to himself. Finally, the paramedics arrived. Ron asked if he should stop. "No," came the terse reply. They needed time to set up, and they wanted him to continue what he was doing.

They eventually yelled, "Ready!" By that point, Ron was completely exhausted and simply crawled out of the way. They shocked Craig 3 times before transporting him to Mission Hospital. When he walked out of the store, Ron asked a fireman what were his chances? He replied, "Not good. Maybe 50%, but you gave him that 50% chance.'

On Tuesday morning, Ron was already at work. The office phone rang; it was his wife. She told him he was about to receive a phone call from someone he didn't know, and that he needed to take that

Immediately, his iPhone rang. A woman's voice asked, "Are you Ron? Are you Ron Eroh?" He replied that he was. She then asked, "Were you in Leslie's Pool Supply on Saturday?" "Yes, I was," Ron answered. There was total silence for a few brief moments. Then this woman began to cry. Through her tears she said to Ron, "You saved my husband's life! You saved my husband's life! You are our Guardian Angel. You are our hero. How does my family and I ever repay you?"

Ron simply replied, "Ma'am, I'm not sure if I am any of those things. But, what I do know, I was at the right place, at the right time, and I knew what to do." By then, Ron said that they were both crying.

The doctors had told Craig's wife, "You do not survive a widow-maker heart attack." According to Craig's doctors, the main artery, which supplies blood and oxygen to the heart, was 100% blocked. In actuality, Craig was dead before he hit the floor. Through the quick response of Ron, the hardwork and skill of the


paramedics (EMTs), and the doctors at Mission Hospital, there was a positive outcome to Craig's story.

Ron's employer, AT&T honored him with the Vale Award. It is the highest honor given to employees for acts that help others. The City of Mission Viejo, gave him the **Difference** Makers Award.

in 1769. The scene depicts the First Spanish Expedition to enter California. They traveled through the wilderness on a route from Baja California all the way to past San Francisco and established what came to eventually become El Camino Real.

The scene was inspired by a painting by **Lloyd Harting** called 'The Call to California" Key figures portrayed are Governor Portola, Sgt. Ortega who directed scouts, Jose Yorba who predicted the region's agricultural potential, Father Crespi who wrote aboout their trek and a Baja Indian,who acted as intermediary with local tribes.



Lloyd Harting was a well-known artist who settled in Mission Viejo early. He had a long career as an ilustrator and worked for both 20th Century Fox and Walt Disney Pictures among other companies. At Disney he worked on 'Pinnochio', 'Fantasia' and was an art director for the film 'Bambi. By the time he semi-retired in Mission Viejo, he had left films and advertising behind and focused on primarily painting Western scenes. His work was collected frrom coast to coast and was even a part of the Air Force's permanent collection.

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
