OP QUESTION FOR THE CHIEF :

I can never understand why you advertise the fact that Mission Viejo will have DUI checkpoints on a particular day. Doesn't that defeat the purpose and limit the amount of arrests?

A ANSWER:

Our United States Supreme Court has ruled that sobriety checkpoints must be publicized in advance of the event. Many reasons exist for the requirement. One of which may be that so the law-abiding, motoring public may not be inconvenienced and can elect to take an alternate route to their destination. The purpose of a DUI Checkpoint is not to increase our DUI arrests, but to decrease the amount of impaired drivers on our city's roads. That's the goal. Certainly, one way is to discourage drivers from drinking and driving is to "advertise". And these DUI or Sobriety checkpoints are events where law enforcement takes the opportunity to educate the driving public and reinforcing our commitment in keeping our residents safe. And if we can keep just one person from starting their vehicle after having one too many, then we have done our job.

At the museum you will find 15 different fire engines. They also have several storage rooms, a board room and shop tool room at their location.

Technically the facility in Mission Viejo is a storage site for the museum and isn't open to the public yet. However, the museum has been working for over 10 years to secure 5 acres of land in partnership with

A Conversation With...



Transplant Recipient

Bob Gaebel, Former Principal at de Portola Elementary

ob Gaebel, former principal of de Portola Elementary School in MissionViejoandtheformerChairpersonoftheMissionViejoPlanning Commission as well as a 44 year resident of M.V. recently received a kidneytransplant. We thought it might be interesting to ask Bob a few questions about the procedure.

What condition led you to need a new kidney?

Iwasdiagnosedwithkidneydisease in my early 30's, via lab tests. In 2010 my kidney function numbers started getting worse. My doctors alerted me to mentally prepare myself for dialysis. I dodged the bulletuntil2014, and started dialysis at that time.

How long were you on dialysis?

I was on dialysis for 3.5 years.

How long did you have to wait to get a kidney?

In California, the wait list is very long and slow moving. After a 7 year wait in California, I found out that the wait time (for a deceased donor transplant) in Arizona was half the time. Consequently, I transferred my wait time to the Mayo Clinic in Phoenix, Arizona. Igotmytransplant 5 months later.

Did you get your kidney from a living or deceased donor?

I got my kidney from a deceased donor.

How did your donor die? I don't know.

Did you meet the family of your donor?

No. It is possible to send a request, and the family has the right to decide whether or not to meet. I hope to meet them soon.

How long were you in the hospital? I was only in the hospital 3 days. My transplantteamwantedmeoutofthe hospital as soon as possible.

How much does a Kidney Transplant cost?

That's a tough question to answer. It all depends on your insurance.

Do you have any advice for someone who is about to start dialysis or is on a wait list for a transplant




The MVAC Annual Irish Festival on the Green hits Mission Viejo on March 14, from 11-5pm at the Village Green located at 24932 Veterans Way.

LOS DOS ÁDOBES DE MISSION VIEJO MISSION VIEJO'S ORIGINAL SETTLERS



Don José Serrano called his ranch **'Cañada de Los Alisos',** and along the El Camino Real he built his first adobe near a spring where native sycamores grew in abundance.

Not far from Serrano's home, on the other side of El Camino Real, **Don Juan Avila**, owner of the even more magnificent Rancho Niguel land grant, also built an adobe. The two families were close, all the more so when Serrano married **Maria Petra Avila**, identified as a sister of Don Avila.

Don José Serrano Those traveling El Camino Real often were invited to stay overnight at the adobes. Music and dancing followed the meal. Then the guest was shown to a room and bed.

Approximately 140 years after Don Serrano took title of his land, members of the newly formed Saddleback Area Historical Society set about identifying the location of the first Serrano adobe. After researching original maps and land deeds, then working with consultants, city officials and the Orange County Historical Commission, they established that the original Serrano home was located in what is

they established that the original Serrano home was located in what is *sycamore Park - home of the Serrano Adobe* now **Mission Viejo's Sycamore Park**, just off Alicia Parkway at the end of Charlinda Drive.

On May 18, 1996, descendants of both the Serrano and Avila families, along with members of the historical society and various Orange County dignitaries, gathered to dedicate a plaque installed where the first Serrano home once stood.

Today, the site remains a peaceful place marked by sycamores and palms. Even the hum of the I-5 freeway—once the location of El Camino Real—doesn't take away any of the beauty.







No parcel in Orange County enjoys a lengthier heritage than does the 40,000acre Rancho Mission Viejo, whose destinies have been guided by Richard O'Neill and his descendants for over a century.



The ranch's legacy began with the first Spanish expedition into Alta California.

The first baptismal in California


On July 22, 1769, Captain Gaspar de Portola, with 63 men and two priests, stepped across the ranch's southern border into local history. Here, in Christianitas Canyon, the baptism of two Indian babes brought Christianity to California and the earliest name to a place in Orange County. Following a night's bivouac near the ranch's

cattle camp on the Ortega, the explorers spent a day and a night on the mesa above O'Neill Park. The loss there of a soldier's gun inspired the name Trabuco (Spanish for blunderbuss) which survives today as the oldest ranch name in the State.

Six years later, the ranch witnessed the first attempt to found Mission San Juan Capistrano. Due to a lack of water the mission was relocated in 1778. Its departure from San Juan Canyon endowed that area with the name 'Mission Viejo' and historians with a dilemma ever since. While the exact whereabouts of the 'Old Mission' remains a mystery, the name has prevailed for over two centuries.





poured into river to herald the opening of the Delta wing of the hotel. As a "water guy" (Bill currently sits on the Lake Mission Vieio Association Board of Directors and is also a Director of Moulton Niguel Water District), he was particularly interested in whether California water was properly represented here. And—as they'd say in the South, "Well, butter my buns and call me a biscuit!"-the waters of Lake Mission Viejo had indeed been blended into them!
