Through those robust community outreach efforts, the Core Area Vision Plan was drafted presenting a vibrant framework for the future. We heard from many residents who said they want to embrace the Oso Creek and trail;

revitalize the old Village Center; and make walkable connections between them so that families can safely enjoy shopping, dining, recreation, cultural features, and improved public amenities. Residents said they wanted to experience all these things in their own downtown Mission Viejo, and importantly, keep the local economy strong by spending their tax dollars here rather than venturing out of Mission Viejo.

Mission Viejo is the 9th largest City in Orange County, yet retail sales have declined as compared to the County average. Coupling that with the economic fallout from the pandemic, it's never been more vital to accelerate an economic revitalization by investing in the Downtown Core – an investment in our future.

What your City Council did on your behalf was to approve the options for financing the purchase of the Stein Mart site off Marguerite Parkway – the first tangible action toward implementing this community-driven vision for a walkable village, paseo, and incredible entry that connects to Oso Creek and Trail.

With the amplified economic challenges we have all faced, it's exciting to embark on something that will enhance the way we live, work and play.

OLD MACDONALD HAD A FARMIN MISSION VIEJO

FAMOUS SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ATTRACTION HAD A HOME IN MISSION VIEJO FOR A SPELL



Old Mac Donald's Farm was located at Crown Valley/5 Frwy., right where the Kaledioscope sits today

Located where the Kaledioscope Shopping Center is today, "Old MacDonald's Farm" was the home of many a Mission Viejo birthday party.

Back then, people would park their cars at the top of a hill on Crown Valley Parkway and push a button that would sound a big horn to let the people at the farm know you were there. The

farm would send a farm tractor pulling a trailer filled with hay bales for people to sit on, and then they would take you back down the hill to the farm which had a petting zoo, a mule-powered merry-go-round, a blacksmith, a barn, a country store and various animals and attractions.

The farm was an attraction that had previously been at Knott's Berry Farm and was run by Kay and Fulton Shaw who then moved it to Mission Viejo in 1969





after a disagreement with Walter Knott and his wife Cordelia.

One of the most beloved features of the farm was the performing animals. **Methuselah**, the goat, would butt things for his oats and grain pellets. **Chicken Little** played a piano for snacks. **Porky Pig** slid down a slide for a treat. **Peter Cottontail** hopped onto a cable car and nibbled alfalfa pellets at the end of the line. They also had chickens that would play pianos, and rabbits that would go down slides for a nickle.

Probably their most famous resident was **Tilly the Taper**, who once escaped from the farm and was found by the police in San Juan Capistrano along Camino Capistrano, in a story that made the national news.





FROM OUR PUBLIC ART DEPT.



These mosaic tile walls depict the eras of Mission Viejo history. One section recalls the cattle, cowboy and brand of Mission Viejo early days. The tile walls are located at the Trailhead of the Oso Creek Trail on Marguerite Parkway. Residents of Mission Viejo installed more than 14 mosaics depicting scenes from the city's history, some at the trailhead on Marguerite Parkway and others along the Oso Creek Trail. In April 2004, almost 2,000 volunteers provided service to their community by installing 15,000 trees and bushes and installing tile on the mosaic wall at the Trailhead Garden.

What's the Difference Between Infestations & Infection

In 2015, a balcony in Berkeley collapsed due to structural failure, as a result 6 people died and 7 were injured. Consequently, California law SB 326 ("Balcony Bill") was passed. It requires that by January 2025, HOA boards cause

the inspection of the elevated elements of their communities. Infestations, which are most commonly noticed and easier to identify, are caused by the infiltration of an outside source, such as subterranean termites, drywood termites or other wood-boring insects.

Infections are less obvious to the untrained eye. They are defined as moisture in direct contact with wood, often identified in inaccessible areas. This creates the perfect environment for fungal growth, due to lack of ventilation.

Fungus and dry rot create far more structural damage than termites. Fungus growth is caused by leaks, and many times it is caused by improperly adjusted sprinkler systems.

It is critical for HOAs to utilize structural pest control firms that are not only concerned with the inspection and recommendations, but also know the uniform building code and local codes, and are licensed to perform all structural repairs and replacements. Contractors must work in conjunction with a licensed Structural Pest Control Operator to apply state registered chemicals, per the Business and Professions Code #8556(a).

On October 15, 1968, President Ronald Reagan, then Governor of California, assisted in the dedication of Saddleback College at a ceremony drawing more than 1,000 community members.



In 1976, President Ford visited Mission Viejo on its 10th anniversary and dedicated the Mission Viejo community flag. The photo shows President Gerald Ford shaking hands with a Mission Viejo High School Marching Band member.





In 2013, former Mission Viejo Mayor Dave Leckness saw this sculpture along El Paseo in Palm Desert and with the dog park opening soon, he thought it would be a perfect fit. He contacted the city of Palm Desert and asked if Mission Viejo could purchase the piece for the entrance to our new dog park. Palm Desert put him in contact with the artist's representative Bunni Benaron. Bunni and Rick Benaron, are the founders of The Hero In You Foundation, and they provide the financial support for the placement of R.HERO sculptures.

Bunni explained that the \$15,000 6-foot tall sculpture piece wasn't for sale...but, they would be happy to donate it. Bunni told Leckness, "These



Sculptures were meant to be displayed at fire stations and police departments, not dog parks, but with you, I'll make an exception."

The Hero in Foundation You seeks to honor first responders, and the sculptures serve as reminders of the sacrifices firefighters, police officers,

paramedics and military service personnel make. They place the art pieces and support them with a kids' educational program hoping to inspire future generations to become heroes.

CARP PENDLETON THE STORY BEHIND THE MARINE'S WEST COAST HOME



General Joseph H. Pendleton

The base was established in 1942 to train U.S. Marines for service in World War II. By October 1944, Camp Pendleton was declared a "permanent installation", and by 1946, it became the home of the 1st Marine Division. It was named after Major General Joseph Henry Pendleton (1860–1942), who had long advocated setting up a training base for the Marine Corps on the west coast.

HISTORY:

In about 1882, the Rancho Santa Margarita y Las Flores land was purchased by wealthy cattleman James Flood and managed by Irishman Richard O'Neill who named it Rancho Mission Viejo. O'Neill was eventually rewarded for his faithful service with half ownership. Under the guidance of O'Neill's son, Jerome, the ranch began to net a profit.

When expansion of all U.S. armed forces was authorized by President Franklin D. Roosevelt's proclamation of an unlimited national emergency on May 27, 1941, an immediate need for additional amphibious force training facilities led to the construction of Camp Pendleton.

In the early 1940s, both the Army and the Marine Corps were looking for land for a large training base. The Army lost interest in the project, but after December 7th 1941, things changed. In April of 1942 it was announced that the rancho was about to be transformed into the largest Marine Corps base in the country. The Marine Corps paid \$4,239,062 for the rancho.

After five months of construction, the Rancho Santa Margarita by Las Flores, became the West Coast's largest military camp. President Franklin D. Roosevelt dedicated the Base on Sept. 25, 1942, in honor of World War I Major General Joseph H. Pendleton who had called for a West Coast training base for so long and who's idea was now a reality.







A ircraft crash sites in Mission Viejo? Yes, and there have been plenty of plane wrecks in the Santa Ana Mountains, Robinson Ranch, Laguna Hills, and San Juan Capistrano area too!. Mission Viejo resident G. Pat Macha, began documenting aircraft accident sites in the mountains and deserts of California in 1963.

Twenty-five years ago, Macha founded the all volunteer,

Project Remembrance Team, and is dedicated to facilitate requests made by next of kin who wish to learn more about the loss of loved ones in local aircraft accidents. The Project Remembrance Team has assisted more than one hundred-fifty next of kin fulfill their wishes for accident reports, maps, photographs, and crash site visitations. More than two dozen memorial markers have been placed at or near crash sites, all accomplished with the permission of property



owners. All missions are completed with respect and admiration for those who have come forth to honor the memory of those whom they have lost. Losses suffered by our first responders and members of our armed forces receive an appropriate extra measure of attention.

The Project Remembrance Team includes retired military service members, pilots, rangers, educators, fire-fighters, law enforcement officers,

professional scuba divers and business people, and many are from the Mission Viejo area. Macha has authored six books on crash sites in California, and he is a well received speaker on aviation accident history and aircraft archaeology. To learn more, visit www.aircraftwrecks.com.

MISSION SAN JUAN CAPISTRANO'S CROWN JEWEL

Just two minutes from Mission Viejo in our neighboring city of San Juan Capistrano, is a "must see". **Mission San Juan Capistrano** is renowned as the "Jewel of the Missions". The key building of the Mission is **Serra Chapel**, which was constructed by Juaneño Native Americans. The center piece of the Chapel is the beautiful baroque altar made of hand-carved cherry wood with a gold leaf overlay and adorned with more than 50 angel faces. It is estimated to be close to 400 years



old and is the largest and most elaborate altar within California's 22-mission system.

In the 1920s, Father St. John O'Sullivan, 'the Great Restorer', initiated a major restoration and expansion of the Serra Chapel. It was during this time that the golden altar was placed inside. It was donated to the church by the Los Angeles Archdiocese.

Getting it here was no easy matter. The incredible altar is from Barcelona, Spain. First, it had to be shipped by boat across the Atlantic and then taken

The Mission's beautiful altar, also known as a retablo Atlantic and then taken across the United States by train. When it arrived at the Mission it was in 396 separate pieces, packaged in 10 larger boxes with no directions on how they should be put together.

They opened the boxes in the courtyard, where it took them several months to figure out how the pieces fit and to reassemble the altar. When they were finished they discovered the altar was too tall to fit in the chapel! So to fit it in, they lifted the roof and added adobe bricks to the walls on the altar side of the chapel, allowing the masterpiece from Barcelona to settle in to its new home.



One day in 1945, fashion photographer André de Dienes met an aspiring model named Norma Jeane Dougherty, soon to be known to the world as Marilyn Monroe. It was a momentous moment, both for his personal life and his photographic portfolio.

Over the next few years, he would be briefly engaged to Norma Jeane, take a number of adventurous road trips with her, and build up a stunning series of portraits which would help launch her modeling, and later, movie career. Enjoy these pictures he took of her at the **Mission San Juan Capistrano** in 1946.



FROM OUR PLANES, TRAINS, AND AUTOMOBILES DEPT.

A WHISTLE STOP THIS SIDE OF HEAVEN NAMED GALIVAN

Just south of today's Oso Parkway and Cabot Road was the whistle stop siding called **Galivan**. This train stop was used for transporting crops, cattle and other freight. Galivan became a daily stop for the Santa Fe in 1922. It was four miles (six minutes) from El Toro and five miles (eight minutes) from San Juan Capistrano. This stop is said to be named for a prominent Santa Fe engineer, **J.B. Galivan**.

For many years, the Santa Fe would whistle when it had something or someone to drop off at Galivan, as well as stopping there if anyone was "flagging" to be taken aboard.

DEFINITION: A flag stop, or whistle stop is a stop or station at which trains respectively stop only on request, that is, only if there are passengers or freight to be picked up or dropped off.
