Intrigue surrounds the very name "Mission Viejo". Does it imply that it was the original site – as in the "old" or "former" mission? In Spanish, the word is really spelled misión and has feminine gender. Thus, in order to agree with the noun, the adjective for misión should have a feminine ending - vieja.

We know that the modern city was named for the 1845 rancho land grant which itself was referred to variously as "Mission Viejo", "Mission Vieja", "Misión Vieja", and as "La Paz".

La Paz translates as "the peace", so there is an undefinable, yet very romantic quality in each word of the now famous Mission Viejo name and of its first main street - La Paz Road.

And there's riding for every type of bike as well, from simple City and BMX bikes, to dual-suspension, disc-brake wielding Mountain Bikes and carbon-fiber featherweight Road Bikes.

Whether you are into flat routes, hilly routes, uphill routes, downhill routes, quick rides, long tours, Mission Viejo offers it all and there is a ride to suit you. From a mild ride around Lake Mission Viejo, longer trips to the ocean or a more serious adventure into Santiago Canyon you can find a smorgasbord of rides to take. Bikemap.com is a great resource for locating routes, getting directions and meeting other riders.

The City of Mission Viejo itself, has been working hard to grow and improve it's citywide interconnected trail system, the heart of which is the 5.5-mile multi-use Oso Creek Trail. Add to that all of the bike shops around town and you can see this truly is a great place for cycling. Just make sure to get a good quality bike helmet, maintain your equipment and follow the rules of the road, riding in groups is also helpful. However you do it, have fun & be careful.

WHY ELECTRIC BIKES ARE MORE Dangerous Than Motorcycles The HIDDEN DANGERS OF RIDING E-BIKES

We've all thought. "Ah, an electric bike, fresh air, the outdoors, I should really do that" but when we think of a motorcycle we think "Heck no! I'll never do that". But in reality, electric bikes are much more dangerous. Ask Mission Hospital, they'll tell you the ER room is loaded with electric bike patients much more than motorcycle patients.

Reason #1 POOR GEAR

The motorcycle rider usually has steel toe boots, a Kevlar lined jacket which reflects with the light of a thousand suns and a full helmet. Whereas, the E-Bike rider is usually only wearing stretchy pants, half a helmet and happy thoughts.

Reason #2 POOR VISIBILITY

Normally car drivers are looking for other cars when turning or maneuvering not bicycles. Selective attention allows drivers to look right though the tiny bicyclists on the road.

Reason #3 POOR SOPHISTICATION



THE LOST AIRPORT

The REAL HISTORY of the San Juan Capistrano Airport

Most people have not been in the area long enough to remember, but there used to be an airport in South Orange County that was lost forever due to tragedy. Originally built in the 1931 in a nearby location, it was relocated and rebuilt again in the 1960's. The airstrip was located at the end of what

is now called Camino Del Avion, near where the **Coach House** is located. It had a 1,400-foot dirt runway and a few small buildings. In the end, 85 planes would call the tiny airport home.

There were a number of squabbles and conflicts politically and otherwise. After clearing all of those hurdles, other problems began to surface.

Eventually, tragedy struck on Memorial Day weekend in May, 1977. A pilot who did not have a commercial flying license lied to the owner of a company which flew large advertising banners behind planes up and down the coastline. The plane he was flying was towing a large banner and crashed shortly after takeoff. A young 5 year-old girl was riding a bicycle along a path bordering San Juan Creek and was struck by the plane's propellor and died.

A month after the accident, the airfield was ordered to be shut down as details of the crash emerged. The airport was closed in 1978. Now, all that remains is the road leading to the airport, Avenida Aeropuerto, and the street where the runway once laid, Calle Aviador.





Did you know... THINGS THAT ARE NO LONGER THERE

Did you know in the shopping center where **Trader Joe's** stands today on Marguerite Parkway there was a roller skating rink? It was called **Skateway** and was very popular year round in the 70's and 80's.

Did you know Mission Viejo had three locations of horse stables? The first one was at the end of the cul-de-sac on Trabuco Circle where

the tennis center parking lot is now located. The second, and largest, was located near Marguerite and La Paz where the Ralph's Center is located. President Ford's son kept his horse there and when he would ride, he was followed around by the Secret Service. The third stable was located near Saddleback College where the animal facility is now located.

Almost 30 years ago, the City of Mission Viejo initiated an effort to

construct a train station in Mission Viejo. The original site considered for the station back in 1990 would have taken out the MV Library (now the Rock Youth Center) and surrounding buildings. Although it had many positive features, due to concerns about the



residential nature of the site (noise and lack of potential for surrounding commercial development) as well as traffic congestion, ultimately it was not selected. Several sites within Mission Viejo were given serious consideration, but each hit roadblocks. In the end, only the joint site with Laguna Niguel could be brought to fruition.

Although sharing a station with Laguna Niguel wasn't the City's first choice, it has worked out well and Mission Viejo pays only 50% instead

of 100% of the annual maintenance costs.

Today, residents can ride the train all weekend for as little as \$10. Next time you'd like to beat the traffic down to San Diego, just stop by the Mission Viejo/Laguna Niguel Station and ride the train.



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MEMORIES FROM MARGUERITE TENNIS CENTER'S EARLY DAYS



Marguerite Tennis Center from the air - 1970's

In 1970, because of the lack of tournaments and prize money for women, Billie Jean King and eight other players defied the tennis establishment to form their own pro circuit. They called it the Virginia Slims Championship.

Many experts doubted they could attract crowds to generate prize money, but the circuit was a huge success. Women's tennis was improving financially, and the United States Tennis Association saw the success they were having and started their own tour. It eventually merged with the Virginia Slims Circuit and developed into the Women's Tennis Association (WTA).

In 1974, the Marguerite Tennis Center was one of the tournament venues. Tennis greats like King and Chris Evert battled it out on our main court. In 1977, the Marguerite Tennis Center hosted the TV show "Challenge of the Sexes" where Farrah Fawcett beat comedian and future convicted sexual offender Bill Cosby in a 9 point tiebreaker.

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

MEETING OF THE MINDS DURING THE BATTLE FOR CALIFORNIA OCCURED IN M.V.'S BACKYARD

A memorial plaque has been installed in **Mission Viejo's Sycamore Park** to honor Juan Avila and Jose Serrano, who built an adobe house there almost 170 years ago.

On January 5, 1847, during the war with Mexico, a meeting was arranged with the famous U.S. Army General Stephen Watts Kearny, Navy Commodore Robert Field Stockton and celebrated scout Kit Carson, who assisted the Americans through this unfamiliar area.

The important meeting was hosted by **Juan Avila**, owner of neighboring Rancho Niguel, in his adobe on the west side of present day Interstate 5 freeway, near Aliso Creek, and at the edge of today's Mission Viejo.

The renowned Mormon Battalion also camped on a portion of this land the same year, on its way from San Diego to recapture Los Angeles during the war with Mexico.

COPTER CRASH FROM 1967

Memorial Day is on May 28th this year, it also has been known as Decoration Day. It is a National holiday for remembering the people who died while serving in the country's armed forces.

In 1967, there were over 11,000 deaths in the U.S. Military in Vietnam that year. In our freshly developing community, tragedy struck on May 5th, of that year, as a Marine CH-46 Sea Knight crashed just off the San Diego Freeway near the corner of La Paz Road and Chrisanta Drive, here in Mission Viejo.

Four Marines - Capt. Vince Tesulov, 29, of Costa Mesa, 1st Lt. Loyd E. Knulson, 23, of Manhattan Beach, Cpl. Larry G. Norman, 20, of Santa Ana and Lance Cpl. Michael F. Hansen, 19, of Garland, Texas, all died in the crash. The helicopter they were riding in brown a

rotor blade, lost control and plunged to the ground and was destroyed in the impact.

The Marines Corp said the craft was on a routine training mission at the time of the crash. The copter was attached to the Marine Medium Helicopter Training Squadron 302 based at the time in Santa Ana. It was the type of chopper being used extensively at the time in Vietnam. The cause of the accident was unknown.



Four Killed in Crash of Marine Helicopter

EL TORO (UPI) - A Marine CH-40 Sea Knight helicopter crashed near a new housing development named Mission Viejo Wednesday night, killing all four men aboard. Witnesses said the twin rotor helicopter lost one of its rotor blades and plummeted to the ground. Richard Wilcox, manager of the Mission Viejo Swim Club, said he saw the transport chopper throw it's blade, stagger out of control and then crash in a ditch not far from a new housing project. The chopper was on a routine training mission about four miles from the El Toro Marine Corps Air Station.


DOCTOR LEAVES A LEGACY BEHIND IN HIS WAKE


Dr. Guevara moved with his family to this newly developing community in 1968, becoming the second physician and first obstetrician-gynecologist to open his office here – across from Mission Viejo High School.

During the 30-year career that followed, **Dr. Guevara** delivered more than 10,000 babies, including the Whistler triplets in 1972 – the first triple birth that occurred in South Orange County.

Among **Dr. Guevara's** ancestors was **Jose Ortega**, the scout who passed through this area with **Gaspar de Portola** during the first Spanish exploration of

MISSION VIEJO'S SHORT BATTLE WITH McDONALDS AND KFC



In the late 1960's as Mission Viejo was growing with beautiful homes and familys, McDonalds and Kentuky Fried Chicken both wanted to be apart of our city. Mission Viejo's Chief Planner Jim Toepfer welcomed both with open arms... with one condition: NO ARCHES and NO BUCKET.

Up until then every McDonalds had the famous golden arches and every Kentucky Fried Chicken proudly displayed the skyscraper, rotating bucket on a pole, out in front of each of the restaurants.

Both restaurants argued that no city has ever challenged these iconic structures and that they are a major part of each restaurant's design and image, and without the arches for McDonalds and the bucket for Kentucky Fried Chicken, the businesses may very likely fail. Mission Viejo executives explained that if they wanted their restaurants in our city, they would have to comply with the strict commerical signage restrictions the new city of Mission Viejo required.

Happily, both restaurants complied and for years have enjoyed serving Mission Viejo residents great food. A few Mission Viejo executives loved Kentucky Fried Chicken so much they bought the Mission Viejo franchise.

MISSION VIEJO'S FRED HILL STARTED IT ALL THE ORIGIN OF THE RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE

It all began in Philadelphia in 1974 when three-year-old **Kim Hill**, the daughter of Philadelphia Eagles football player **Fred Hill** and his wife **Fran**, was being treated for leukemia at St. Christopher's Hospital For Children. During Kim's three years of treatment, the Hills often camped out on hospital chairs and benches



and ate makeshift meals out of vending machines, while they watched other parents doing the same thing. They learned that many of the families traveled great distances to bring their children to the medical facility but couldn't afford hotel rooms.

The Hills knew that there had to be a solution. Fred rallied

the support of his Eagles teammates and eventually developed a comfortable temporary residence for families of children being treated at hospitals, The Ronald McDonald House.

Today there are 366 Ronald McDonald Houses in 42 countries and regions. Those Houses provide over 7,200 bedrooms to families around the world each night, helping make things easier for children and their families globally, all of which took root from a man with a dream in our city about 44 years ago. The Hills family continues to operate two McDonald's franchises in M.V..




Bar over thirty years ago. The day Mission Viejo Reporter visited

Shooters, there were other customers who said, "Lizzy is someone you want to come visit with," and "She makes a great Bloody Mary and pours a mean beer."


Before we snapped a picture of Lizzy for this article, we remembered the advice Joe gave us - "Lizzy is great, just don't piss her off."



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
